






Our school will be holding a food drive in December.

The students in Grade 7/8 E Wildlife Habitat class have been hard at work learning about "Petroglyphs" and "Pictographs".

We read the book "On The Trapline" by David Alexander Robertson. The students chose a page and created their own "stencil" to recreate what was being talked about on their particular page. Once they finished the "stencil", they used horse hair and/or cattails to paint the inside of their stencil. Mme Poirier picked some type of "low raspberry plant" from her mother's garden. We crushed those berries and made a dye. This dye was used to paint the inside of the stencil. We painted the stencil onto canvas material. Once dried, the students put their painting in a picture frame and placed them in the bush. The paintings look like pictographs.

Sandra Bear helped the entire class with how to pronounce all the Cree words, in the story. Thanks so much for sharing your knowledge with us.

On Monday, October 20th and Wednesday, October 23rd, the grade 1, 2 English and French classes were asked to join a live reading. Once we finished the book walk, in the forest, we proceeded to the art room. The 1 and 2's chose a pictograph to color onto their own canvas piece.

The grade 7/8's E, did a wonderful job of reading their pages, showing their pictograph, and pronouncing some very new and difficult Cree words. Good job, crew!

Each month in the Highlights and Treasures we highlight something from our school handbook. This month we are focusing on three sections – Attendance & Punctuality; Informing the School about Absences, Lates, &/or Leaving Early; and Sign Out Policy. Our complete school handbook can be found on the school website.



### **Attendance & Punctuality**

Students are expected to be on time and attend regularly, except in cases of illness or special circumstances. The Ministry of Education, under the Education Act, states that students must attend regularly and punctually. Regular and punctual attendance:

are necessary to achieve the best results

are the commitment a student makes when registering in a course

develop positive attitudes

are a factor contributing to the success of students

Individual teachers implement necessary strategies and/or consequences to encourage good attendance and punctuality.

These may include:

- A phone call, letter, email home
- A meeting with parents/ guardians and/ or administration
- Recommendation to withdraw from the course

When late or absent, students are always responsible to complete any missed work. For students to significantly benefit from classroom experiences, they must be in class. A large part of the final mark in all subjects is determined by assessing a student's progress from day to day. It is at the discretion of the 10-12 subject teacher to determine if each student has attended a sufficient number of classes and completed the necessary amount of work to pass the subject. Regular attendance is crucial for a student to experience the greatest success. Classroom teachers will make every effort to contact parents or guardians of students who are frequently late or who are absent from school for no legitimate reason. The number of absences per student will be recorded on progress reports.

### Informing the School about Absences, Lates, &/or Leaving Early

You can enter attendance information in Edsby, which is the most ideal way to report your child(ren)'s absence, lateness, or the need to leave school early. You can also call the school and inform the office or your child(ren)'s teacher(s).

If you have not reported your child's absence, at about 9:30am, you will receive an automated phone call from the office. These phone calls are put into place so that we can ensure the safety of our students. A quick phone call to the school or a reply to the automated phone call is appreciated.

### **Sign Out Policy**

If you need to pick up a student from the school during the school day, please stop at the office to sign the child out, and we will locate the student for you. If it is necessary for your child to leave the school during the day, and you are not picking them up, the student must have parent/ guardian permission and they must sign out at the office. They cannot sign themselves out without parent/ guardian permission. Parents/ guardians can provide this permission through Edsby, by contacting the office, or by contacting the class/ subject teacher.

Students who leave at noon and will not be returning for the afternoon are also required to sign out. If a student leaves and returns, he/she must sign in at the office upon returning.

Please note that there are always learning opportunities going on at school. Sometimes students will tell their parents that "we aren't doing anything in class today, we don't need to be there". If you have questions about what is going on at school on a particular day, please call the school. We always ask and encourage students' attendance at school whether it is a "regular" school day, or a day with other planned experiences – ie Terry Fox Run, Opening Doors to Tomorrow Career Fair, Gym Blast, Ski/Snowboard Trips. These experiences all have curricular connections. Also, please note that things like "Freshie week-end preparation" and "Skip Day" are not school sanctioned/ school excused absences.
